'Pile of Bones' was the original name of what is now the capital city of Saskatchewan, the Canadian province I grew up in. It was so named for the huge piles of buffalo bones that were stacked high on the site. Later, Pile of Bones was thought to be an odd name for a town so it was given the 'regal' name Regina.

Pile of Bones examines nurture, darkness, suppression, and desire. From the quietest embryonic origins, the work gradually intensifies towards a pulsing, rapturous end. All elements - sonic, visual and physical - amplify over time.

The work follows a logic that is emotional rather than linear. There is rupture and disquiet as the four dancers travel together through an unpredictable landscape. Bodies are encrusted in fluttering armour and caught in sticky webs. Inner demons and angels have influence over their actions. The piles of bones are reliant on each other but also rail against that dependence. Bodies twitch, melt and writhe in dream-like scenarios.

Birth and rebirth and birth again, new selves constantly emerge.
These precarious selves undulate through states, through stability and instability, move as if they're learning how to walk again. New micro societies are built and demolished, new rules and rituals to observe, new ways to fail and succeed.

Animal-like, the performers herd, protect and attack. They are attracted and they are repelled.

Are they human? Animal? Robots?

Are they from the past or the future?

Pile of Bones attempts to shine a light on the absurdity and deep pleasure of human existence and the drive to create, produce, consume.

To what end?

We are all walking piles of bones, destined for the same place.

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Stephanie Lake

Choreographer

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Stephanie Lake is an award-winning choreographer and dancer. Her performance career spans seventeen years, touring extensively with Lucy Guerin Inc and Chunky Move and she was a founding dancer in Balletlab. Stephanie's dance works have been presented in major festivals and venues around Australia and have toured to France, Germany, Hong Kong, Denmark and the UK. In 2014 Stephanie won both the Helpmann Award and Australian Dance Award for Best Choreography and the Green Room Award in 2011. She was the recipient of a Sidney Myer Creative Fellowship and the Dame Peggy van Praagh Choreographic Fellowship. In 2013 she was appointed inaugural Resident Director of Lucy Guerin Inc.

Stephanie has been commissioned by Chunky Move, New Zealand Dance Company, Sydney Dance Company, Queensland Ballet, Dancenorth, Tasdance, Expressions and Frontier Danceland (Singapore). She collaborates across theatre, film & TV, visual art and music video and has directed large-scale public works involving over 1000 participants.

Dancer

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Samantha Hines was born in Sydney, Australia. She studied contemporary dance full time at both Sydney's Ev and Bow and New Zealand School of Dance and in her final year was hired by Australian Dance Theatre. While with Australian Dance Theatre Samantha performed and toured extensively with the company throughout Australia, Europe and Asia. In 2013 she embarked on the Australian tour of *G, Proximity* at the Arts Centre Melbourne along with two European tours of *Proximity* in 2013 & 2014.

In 2015 she performed in three European tours of *Multiverse*, as well as the Australian national tour of *Be Your Self*. Samantha has performed in the world premiere seasons of Daniel Jaber's *Nought* (2013), Garry Stewart's *Multiverse* (2014), *Habitus* (2016) and *Beginning of Nature* (2016). She is now working with Dancenorth where she performed in Lucy Guerin and Gideon Obzanerak's show *Attractor* (2017) for which she was nominated for a Helpmann Award.

In 2013, he was awarded a Victorian College of the Arts Undergraduate Most Outstanding Creative Scholarship. He has also performed in the frame of Ludwigshafen Pfalzbau (Germany), Pieces For Small Spaces at Lucy Guerin Inc (Melbourne), and Murray White Room Gallery (Melbourne).

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Jack began dancing in Canberra at Quantum Leap Youth Dance Company before starting his tertiary training at the Western Australian Academy of Performing Arts. Joining Expressions Dance Company in 2011 under artistic director Natalie Weir, Jack was fortunate to perform in many of Weir's signature award winning works. He toured extensively nationally and internationally and collaborated with other companies including Queensland Ballet, Opera Queensland, Cathy Sharpe Dance Ensemble, LDTX/Beijing Dance, Singapore Dance Theatre and Guangzhou Modern Dance Company. He has collaborated and performed with Kate Weare (USA), Chrissie Parrot, The Farm, Lucy Guerin Inc, STRUT, Dancenorth and created several of his own works for QL2 at the Australian Choreographic Centre in Canberra. Jack is a multiple nominee for both the Australian Dance Awards and the Helpmann Awards for Best Dance Performance by a Male.

Robin Fox

Composer

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Robin Fox is an audio-visual artist working across composition, performance, public artworks and installation among other things. His laser works have been touring internationally for over a decade and have featured in festivals in well over 50 cities. Current projects include the development of a new laser work Single Origin, which will premiere at Unsound Festival Krakow in October, the film score for Guilty (working title) - a feature documentary about the last 72 hours of Myuran Sukumaran's life and his work as founding director of MESS (Melbourne Electronic Sound Studio) an organisation that gives the public access to the history of electronic music machines. In dance he has worked with Lucy Guerin (Dark Chorus, Motion Picture, Conversation Piece, I'm Trying to Tell You), Gideon Obarzanek (Mortal Engine, Connected), Antony Hamilton (RGB, Drift, Keep Everything) and Stephanie Lake (Dugl. A Small Prometheus, Aorta, Dream Lucid, Double Blind) among many others.
